

Opening Question: Share a time when you felt wronged or insulted. How did you respond, and how do you wish you had responded?

Key Takeaways:

- 1. Jesus teaches us to respond to injury and injustice in ways that reflect God's kingdom, not worldly reactions.
- 2. The Sermon on the Mount provides case studies to help us think like citizens of God's kingdom, not rigid rules.
- 3. Following Jesus means actively unlearning worldly ways and conforming our lives to His pattern.
- 4. Our calling is to give the world a reflection of God, even in difficult situations.

Discussion Questions:

- 1. How does Jesus' teaching on "turning the other cheek" challenge our natural instincts? What might this look like in modern contexts?
- 2. The sermon mentions that "eye for an eye" was meant to limit revenge, not promote it. How does this change your understanding of that Old Testament law?
- 3. Discuss the concept of "not resisting an evil person" as presented in the sermon. How is this different from being passive or allowing injustice?
- 4. How does the civil rights movement's approach, as described in the sermon, exemplify Jesus' teachings? Can you think of other historical or contemporary examples?
- 5. The sermon states, "To love those who love you... makes you a good pagan." How does this challenge your understanding of what it means to follow Jesus?
- 6. Reflect on the statement: "Martin Luther King recognized... White people were also held bondage by forces of evil." How does this perspective change how we view those who wrong us?
- 7. How can we apply Jesus' teaching on "going the extra mile" in our daily lives and relationships?
